We have so much to share with you in this edition of the Dimmick Digest. There is always something happening at the library!

As a proponent of life-long learning, Dimmick and Penn Kidder libraries are incredibly proud to have received substantial grant and education opportunities over the last few months. We have partnered with the SHINEonPA STEM Ecosystem in the award and implementation of a \$500,000 PAsmart Advancing Computer Science and STEM Education Grant.

Along with 13 other libraries and community centers from Carbon, Schuylkill, Luzerne, Wayne, Pike, Monroe, and Lehigh counties, we will be building a 21st Century Learning Hub to include over \$20,000 of devices and supplies to allow members of our community to engage in STEM-based learning. We will work with the SHINEonPA STEM Ecosystem to expand STEM learning capacity in the community, receive professional development opportunities for our program staff, and explore ways to continue to support the learning efforts of the children and their families in our community.

We will offer learning and use of robotics, coding, electronic building sets, engineering challenge materials from prestigious companies such as Ozobot, STEAM, Apple, MakeyMakey, BrickLab, KEVA, and Strawbees. We look forward to working closely with our SHINEonPA STEM Ecosystem colleagues and offer incredible opportunities to students of all ages in our community!

September is National Library Card Sign Up Month!

Did you know that September is National Library Card Sign Up Month? Library Card Month has been around since 1987, in response to William Bennett, the Secretary of Education at the time, who said "Every child should have a library card and use it." This prompted a campaign to popularize the usage of library cards, especially during the beginning of the school year, when children were most likely to sign up for services. Since then, September has become the month that libraries across the nation campaign to get cards into the hands of as many new patrons as possible.

Don't have a library card yet? or, already have one and know someone that could use one? Here's a few reasons why libraries are an integral part of the community:

- Libraries can save you BIG money. Libraries gives patrons access to hundreds of thousands of books and DVDs. Rather than buying these materials, which can cost anywhere from \$8-30 a piece, you can borrow them free of charge. Plus, we don't have late fines at the Dimmick, so you can read at your own pace.
- Programming provides a safe space for families to go.
 At the library, we have several recurring groups, but we also provide weekly Storytime for children, and unique monthly programs where patrons can de-stress, regardless of their age or ability.
- Our resources are out of this world! Most people don't realize that libraries provide so much more than just books! We also have museum passes for local historical sites patrons can check out, and hotspots that patrons can borrow. Plus, we have a microfiche on site and access to genealogical resources! Not to mention, we can also print color images, and even laminate items for you!



If you're a huge fan of Second Chance Romance, or maybe you'd like to try it for the first time-we definitely recommend checking out Emily Henry's latest release, *Happy Place*.

Harriet and Wyn have been together for forever. Until, they're not. Breaking up just six months before their annual trip with friends, they decide to go anyway...as a couple. If they don't tell anyone, maybe everyone can have one more trip that feels "normal" before things change. That's what they tell themselves anyway. But, even with LA calling her name, the sea is speaking to her (and maybe Brendan is now, too?) and Piper will have to decide whether she's going to stay or go at the end of her probation.




"Fake Dating"

But, the thing about fake dating is that it feels a lot like real dating, and it's just too easy to fall for someone.




Historic Homes Tour Comes to Library

If you have visited the Children's space in the libraries lately, you may have seen some colorful changes!



Escaping Into A World of Fantasy: A Court Of Thorns And Roses

I was standing at the Circ Desk the other day and a patron returned a mammoth of a book, slapped it down on the desk, and asked me if I'd read it? Of course, I hadn't read the acclaimed ACOTAR books. Why?

Last year, I devoted a significant amount of time (and reading goals) to reading popular books-you know the ones...the ones trending on Booktok that everyone just can't stop talking about. Yet, I found that despite the many recommendations, I struggled to connect with the writing. So, I was a *bit* skeptical when *A Court of Thorns and Roses* crossed my path. This book is the epitome of popular. Topping Goodreads charts at over 1 million ratings, and a nominee for a 2015 Goodreads choice award, this book is one of the most well-reviewed books on the popular platform. Not to mention, it's STILL on the Amazon bestseller charts, despite being released over five years ago now.

And, it's Fantasy. My least favorite genre. There was no way I was going to pick this book up, right? Wrong. I stood at the desk and read the first two pages of that book and was immediately hooked. And when I say immediately, I mean IMMEDIATELY. I seriously took that thing home and didn't eat dinner until almost ten o'clock that night.

The really intriguing thing about going in blind to *A Court of Thorns and Roses* is that everything hits so hard, I wanted to laugh and gasp aloud, while simultaneously skipping over entire paragraphs. I had no idea what was going to happen from one scene to the next and I had to work to slow myself down because the plotline was just that good. Which, I should probably at least explain instead of just ranting about how good the book is.

So the book starts with nineteen-year-old Feyre. She's living in this little tiny cottage with her father and her sisters. Her family used to have money, but her father got himself into some kind of trouble with his business and now they can barely afford to eat. Feyre's older sisters are struggling with this change--one's a little airheaded, and the other's definitely arrogant--neither seems to have the skills or the motivation to keep the family alive, so it's down to Feyre to hunt to keep the family fed. One day, Feyre comes across a wolf in the woods, killing it to provide for her family. Soon after, a terrifying creature comes to the family's door, demanding retribution for the wolf (who, ahem, was actually a faerie). Feyre has no choice but to go with this creature to the magical land she's only heard about in legends. There, she quickly learns that the beast that has broken her family apart is no creature, but instead one of the lethal, immortal faeries who used to rule the human world.

With no choice but a lifetime imprisoned in the fairy realm, Feyre adjusts to her new reality, and her feelings for the creature that took her from his home, Tamlin, turn from icy hostility into a fiery passion. But something else is happening in the faerie lands. A wicked shadow has been cast over Tamlin's home, and it might be up to Feyre to figure out how to help Tamlin and his crew. Even if she's only human.

When I tell you I FLEW THROUGH THIS BOOK. The entire first novel is a little over 400 pages, which goes remarkably fast. In fact, my biggest recommendation is to check out *A Court of Mist and Fury* at the same time as *A Court of Thorns and Roses*. That way, you can read right through to the sequel! I had the entire first three books finished within a week and it was totally worth losing my social life for seven days to escape into the world of the spring court.

John H. Bushnell's "A Conversation in Color" Returns to the Dimmick


